When I came to Canada, I bought chickens and bread, Not just for the day—but as much as possible. I couldn't stop eating, I just wanted more. When I weighed one hundred and eighty pounds I stopped. I had dreamed about chickens and bread for years. And I thought I would never eat well again. I thought that always I would be hungry. I stopped worrying about hunger when I married, When there was enough money for food. I had no money, So I worried for two years about food for my children. Money and marriage, Those were the hopes that could take away the hunger. Soon hunger is part of the remembering, Even then, We all know that an empty heart sits on a full stomach.

This poem was created by the Holocaust Survivors' Group, a unique group of women, originating from a variety of different countries, cultures, and lifestyles.
